London's children, who are getting evacuated, cause complete chaos at Victoria Station.

On the first of September, all children of London are getting ready to evacuate for safety reasons



All of these children are getting ready for evacuation by waiting in a singe file line outside of their school building with their teachers until its time to go to Victoria Train Station. Here at Victoria station it is very busy and extremely loud. Nearly all the children in London are here to be evacuated., and to add to the noise about three quarters are crying. Mothers are reluctantly giving their children away to the train whilst other children are clinging on to their parents to keep their lives.

There are martials everywhere to direct the children to the correct carridge of the train. Children are lining up with their schools and being ordered to a specific seat. Some schools are larger than others and some carriages aren't big enough for all the children so they have to squeeze in very tightly. Some children had bad diseases and others had a bad appearance because they come from poor families. Some looked very rich and were practically blinding in there such perfect outfits. We interviewed a family of five, a mother Maria Hawks, Lowenna Hawks, a two-yearold Seth Hawks, a five-year-old William Hawks, a ten-year-old and Rebecca Hawks, a fifteen year old. All the answers where different:

Lowenna said, "Mummy said we are going on an adventure!"

Seth asked, "Why are there so many people?"

William said, "I hope we will be picked together."

Rebecca said, "This is ridiculous. Why should this happen anyway?"

Maria said, "I'm so worried for my little darlings all I want is for them to be okay, if it wasn't for the war then I would keep them in my arms."

Children were crying and so were their parents but they knew it was for the children's safety. Eventually they got Paradise School into their carriage. They still had twelve to go:
