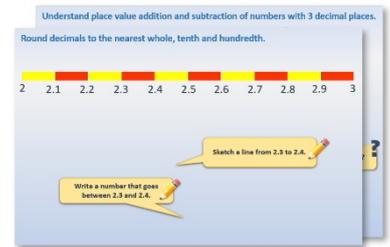

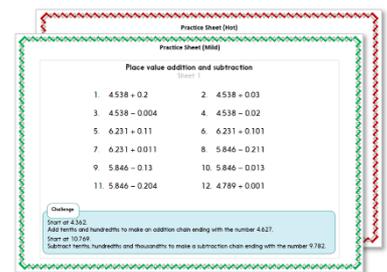
Tell the time to the half hour

Each day covers one maths topic. It should take you about 1 hour or just a little more.

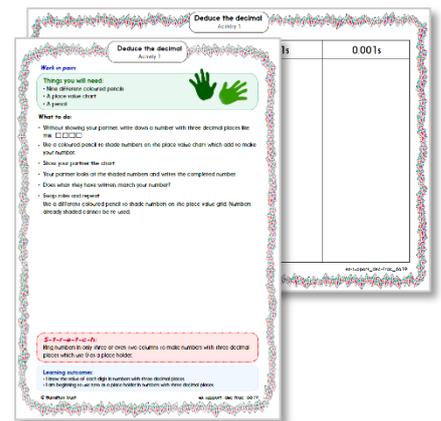
1. Start by reading through the **Learning Reminders**. They come from our *PowerPoint* slides.

Learning Reminders

Tell the time to the hour and half hour.



The clock is showing
8 o'clock in the morning.


The little hand is called the **hour hand** because it shows what hour of the day it is.

The long hand is called the **minute hand** because it shows how many minutes past or to the hour it is.

What might you be doing at this time?



Tell the time to the hour and half hour.



What has happened?

What time is it now?


The **minute hand** has moved **half way** around the clock!

The **hour hand** is **halfway** between 8 and 9.

We call this time **half past 8**, because it's half an hour past 8 o'clock.



A Bit Stuck? Time to play

Play in pairs

Things you will need:

- Two sets of 'Time to play' cards
- Counters/ pennies



What to do:

- Spread out your time cards, face down.
- Your partner holds their cards facing them.
- Pick up a card. Don't let your partner see what's on it.
- Read the time.
- Your partner finds a card to match this time and shows you.
- Show your card. Do they match?
- If so, take a counter/ penny each.
- Keep playing until you have used five of your cards.
- Swap roles and repeat.

How many counters/pennies can you win?


S-t-r-e-t-c-h:

Choose a time and say what happens at that time of day.



- I am beginning to know o'clock times for key times of the day.



Investigation Time challenge


1. Work with a partner.
Spread out the word cards face down.
2. **First player:**
Take a clock face. Draw on the hands at an o'clock time.
3. **Second player:**
Take a word card. Read it.
4. Together, work out a time that fits what the card tells you. Discuss this, for example, What time is soon after your time? 3:30.
5. Draw it on a clock face. This is your new time.
6. Take another card, for example, earlier.
Together: work out a time that fits what the card tells you, for example, 2:00.

BUT you may not draw a time you have already had!

7. Draw your agreed time on a clock face. This is your new time.
8. Keep playing like this until you have used all the cards if you can.
You may get stuck! Discuss why you are stuck.

Turn the cards over and play again.

Which times are morning? Which are afternoon?
What makes it hard to use a card?
