Wrens class

This week in Wrens class we have been reading Monkey Puzzle by Julia Donaldson and have been talking about how baby butterflies are caterpillars. We looked at this butterfly on the computer and talked about ways in which the caterpillar was similar and different.

Doves class

This week in English Doves have been learning an information text all about tigers. We have enjoyed acting out the information, drawing text maps and using roll play to deepen our understanding of the text.

In PSHE, we have been discussing the different roles people have in our school community. It was lovely to hear how the children understood and appreciated the variety of roles there are in school which enable them to feel comfortable, safe and secure.

Buzzards class

Buzzards have been working hard this week on preparing speeches. The Year 6 children have the opportunity to give a speech to encourage the school community to vote for them as the Pendennis or Trelawney House Team Captain and the Year 5's are campaigning to be selected by the I.S.C.E.A. for an important space mission to Mars! We have explored the characteristics of speech writing, discussed the qualities needed for each role and drafted our speeches. Next week, we are planning to give our speeches. Computing was very excited this week as we took on the role of Cipher decoders. The children problem solved to try to crack a range of ciphers. They were quite tricky to solve, and it took lots of perseverance.

In our PE, we were very active. We worked collaboratively in develop our passing accuracy using a rugby ball. It was challenging accurately passing the ball over longer distances whilst moving. Many of us showed good Growth Mindset skills by not giving up because it was hard. As a result, lots of progress was made in the lesson.

In maths, we have continued to explore comparing and ordering larger numbers and rounding.

In science, we are looking at evidence and exploring the scientific ideas suggested, how these can be tested and the way ideas change over time.

Some Year 6 children have had a great end to the week by taking part in 'Bikeability'. They have really enjoyed themselves whilst learning lots of important rules for cycling safely.

<u>Jigsaw PSHE</u>

Dear Parents/Carers

PSHE Education (Personal, Social, Health and Economic Education) is a planned programme of learning through which children and young people acquire the knowledge, understanding and skills they need to successfully manage their lives – now and in the future. As part of a whole-school approach, PSHE Education develops the qualities and attributes pupils need to thrive as individuals, family members and members of society.

Jigsaw is a whole-school approach and embodies a positive philosophy and creative teaching and learning activities to nurture children's development as compassionate and well-rounded human beings as well as building their capacity to learn.

Jigsaw has two main aims for all children:

To build their capacity for learning To equip them for life

Jigsaw brings together PSHE Education, compulsory Relationships and Health Education, emotional literacy, mindfulness, social skills, and spiritual development.

All year groups work on the same theme (Puzzle) at the same time at their own level. There are six Puzzles (half-term units of work), and each year group is taught one lesson per week. Each Puzzle starts with an introductory assembly, generating a whole school focus for adults and children alike. There is also a Weekly Celebration that highlights a theme from that week's lesson across the school encouraging children to deepen their understanding and embrace the learning focus in their behaviour and attitudes.

We are currently working on our first puzzle 'Being Me in My World' it covers a wide range of topics, including a sense of belonging, welcoming others and being part of a school community, a wider community, and a global community; it also looks at children's rights and responsibilities, working and socialising with others, and of pupil voice.

Please ask your child/children what they been learning in their PSHE lesson.
